I am just back from an amazing preaching conference. It was such a gift to be filled with empowering preaching, heart-moving prayers and *the singing*. If you ever get the chance to be in a huge sanctuary with a pipe organ blasting and the voices of over one thousand clergy singing a full-throated version of "Lift Every Voice and Sing," I highly recommend it! This change of scenery helped me get re-energized for ministry.

There are moments in our spiritual lives when we feel stuck—caught in routine, burdened by sameness, or simply weary. At these times, one of the most healing things we can do is to step away, to change our scenery, and to allow fresh surroundings to stir something new within us. Jesus often withdrew to the mountains or the sea to pray and reflect. We are also called to appreciate the restoring power of a change to renew our hearts and deepen our connection with God.

A change of scenery doesn't have to mean traveling to a preaching conference or a major life upheaval. It can be as simple as walking a different route through the neighborhood, spending a quiet morning in a new coffee shop, or even rearranging a room in your home to open up space—literally and spiritually. These small shifts remind us that God's presence isn't confined to the familiar. In unfamiliar places, our senses awaken, our perspectives widen, and we often hear God's voice in surprising ways.

This month, I invite you to consider how a change of scenery might be part of your spiritual practice. Whether it's visiting a local park with intention, or just moving your prayer time outside, trust that the Spirit moves powerfully when we step out of our comfort zones. Change is not just something to endure—it's an opportunity for transformation.

May each change of view be a glimpse of the holy for you.



Sabbatical Theme: Live a Good Story

From the tale of Noah's ark, to the narrative of the nativity, to the many parables of Jesus, our Bible is full of stories. The idea that, "God created humans because God loves a good story" is often attributed to Elie Wiesel, the Nobel Prize-winning writer and Holocaust survivor.

Wiesel believed deeply in the power of stories, both as a means of preserving memory and to understand the human condition. We can see life itself as a narrative, filled with struggles, triumphs, and moral lessons.

As we look ahead, our theme for this summer at CCoL is, "*Live a Good Story*" reflecting Rev. Jen's theme for her time away. The plans Rev. Jen has for her summer sabbatical include traveling, collecting stories and attending writing programs. Her love of a good story (especially punctuated with humor) that illustrates our Christian faith is the guiding focus.

To that end: **Mark your calendars**—something special is coming to the Congregational Church of Littleton! On **Friday, September 6th at 7:00 PM**, we're hosting our first-ever *Storytelling Night*, an evening dedicated to the art of sharing true, heartfelt, and meaningful stories from our lives. Whether your story is funny, tender, surprising, or inspiring, we want to hear it—and we want to hear *you*. The theme is: "What an Adventure!"

Each storyteller will have **five minutes** to share a personal story—no notes, no pressure, just a room full of friendly faces and open hearts. You don't have to be a performer or a public speaker—just someone with a story to tell. Maybe it's about a lesson you learned the hard way, a moment that changed you, or a memory that still makes you laugh out loud. If you can connect it to the theme, it matters, and it belongs in the circle.

Look for brochures in July and August with tips for storytelling. Whether you plan to tell a story or simply come to

listen, you'll be part of something deeply human and joyfully connective. Stories remind us that we're not alone—that grace, growth, and laughter live in every life. Come be a part of this evening of community and connection. Who knows? You might leave inspired to tell your own story next time.

## Give the Gift of a Second Chance

At the April Church Council meeting, one of the key topics discussed was the overall safety of our church community. A significant outcome of that discussion was the decision to pursue the purchase of an Automated External Defibrillator (AED) for our church building, along with the necessary training for its use.


An AED is a portable medical device designed to help people experiencing sudden cardiac arrest—a condition where the heart unexpectedly stops beating. The device analyzes the heart's rhythm and, if needed, delivers an electric shock to help restore a normal heartbeat. According to the American Heart Association, sudden cardiac arrest is a leading cause of death in the U.S., contributing to approximately 1,000 deaths each day.

Our church building is not only a place of worship but also a hub for community gatherings, including events hosted by the Neighborhood Supper, the Littleton Historical Society, and other groups—many of which serve older adults. Having an AED on-site could be life-saving in an emergency.

To fund this important initiative, we are seeking support from external sources such as the Rotary Club and grant programs offered by AED manufacturers. In addition, several church members and groups have already pledged their support.



# Council Update May 8, 2025

Rev. Jen opened the meeting of the Council with a prayer.

The bulk of the meeting was a lengthy discussion led by the Property Committee concerning plans for repairing the church steeple. A quote was received for repair at \$78,000 to do all that needs to be done. To remove the spire and replace it with a cap was quoted at \$30,000. Property and Finance will try to find other contractors to gather more quotes. It was agreed that something must be done now as we cannot leave the present hole to let in weather and possibly creatures. The decision was made to employ a contractor to plug the hole as soon as possible, giving the church the time needed to make decisions regarding funding for a complete steeple repair.

Other Property focuses included the weathervane complete refurbishment, men's room repairs, and the installation of a Ring doorbell to make it safer for staff to screen those who would like to enter the building. A lawnmower has been donated to the church. As a result of a fire safety inspection, the hood over the stove needs cleaning and the Exit signs need battery backup.


Kathy Keenan announced that the pledging is going smoothly. The Easter offering missed the goal by \$1500, but the church received another \$500 for the contractor's use of the parking lot. During these uncertain times the church invested funds show a net loss of \$68,648.

Rev. Jen reminded the Council that there will be an All-Committee night on June 2. All committee members are expected to come. Worship coverage has been arranged for Rev. Jen's sabbatical. Rev. Jen is planning to bring a storyteller to the church to encourage

members of the congregation to learn how to write and tell their stories.

Holly Magner closed the meeting with prayer.
